NOTE: For discussion of the five themes: Each West African participant will have 10-12 minutes to lay out the major issues or dynamics in question in his/her country. 2 invited commentators (scholars invited from the US and/or local scholars) will then be asked to comment generally and ask questions for 10 minutes each, followed by general and open discussion of the topic among all participants. This format will allow for this to be a real “workshop” with intensive interaction among participants and commentators.

For the Wednesday afternoon public session, invitations will be sent out broadly to interested parties in Dakar, and it will be set up in a conference format for the “*grand publique*”. Several speakers (or all of the West African guests) will be asked to make short presentations summarizing the main themes, debates, and conclusions reached by the participants during the workshop. Participants should decide on the precise format and set of topics among themselves in accordance with discussion in the workshop sessions.
